### *4th Generation Nicholas Greenawalt Families*

4.7 Ira Benjamin Greenawalt <sup>i</sup> Ira was born December 14<sup>th</sup> 1876 to Henry and Jeanette Greenawalt in Southampton Township Franklin County Pennsylvania. He was known his entire life as Benjamin or Ben. On October 4<sup>th</sup> 1900, when he was 22 years old, Ben applied for a marriage license with Jane Wagner Angle. They married on October 7<sup>th</sup> 1900 at the Middle Springs Parsonage, outside of Shippensburg Pennsylvania, by the pastor Samuel S. Wylie.

Jane (Jennie) Wagner Angle was born June 1878 to Samuel Alexander Angle and Margaret (Maggie) Hykes. Maggie was born February 1850 to Isaac and Jane Hykes. Isaac was a Tailor who was born 1824 in Pennsylvania, and Jane was born 1826 in Pennsylvania. Samuel Angle was born December 1850 to Martin and Catherine Angle of Shippensburg Pennsylvania. Martin was a Miller who was born in Maryland about 1827, and Catherine was born about 1826 in Pennsylvania. Together they had eight children; five lived to adulthood. Margaret died when she was 59 years old in 1909. Samuel, Margaret, their parents, and a few of their children were laid to rest in the Spring Hill Cemetery, Shippensburg Pennsylvania.

- A. George R. Angle was born March 1875
- B. Gertrude (Gertie) L. Angle was born 1873, and died at the age of 99 in 1971.
- C. Florence Angle died at birth in 1876
- D. Samuel Angle was born 1877 and died 1878
- E. Jane (Jennie) Wagner Angle was born June 1878
- F. Walter H. Angle was born June 1880
- G. Bertha Angle was born 1882, and died at 7 years old in 1889.
- H. John I. Angle was born September 1883

Jane's middle name Wagner may be a family name, possibly one of her grandmother's maiden name; Catherine Angle or Maggie Hykes. Jane Angle had a son from another relationship; Rodney V. Angle who was born in July 1896 when Jane was 18 years old. Rodney lived with his grandparents Samuel and Margaret Angle on Penn Street in Shippensburg Pennsylvania. At 22 years old Rodney died shortly after graduating from Franklin and Marshal College in 1917, resulting from an automobile accident at a railroad crossing. He was laid to rest in the Spring Hill Cemetery Shippensburg Pennsylvania. The Angle and Hykes families all lived on South Penn Street Shippensburg Pennsylvania.

Sometime around 1910 Ben was given a 90 acre farm, known as the Blue Mountain farm, which was located 4 miles north of the blue mountain turnoff of the Pennsylvania Turnpike. <sup>ii</sup>This farm would be near the Lurgan Township border with Fannett Township Franklin County Pennsylvania, and the intersecting borders between Franklin, Cumberland, and Perry Counties. The farm was first owned by Benjamin's brother David Franklin (Frank) Greenawalt. However, at this time Ben began to suffer from a bone disease which caused a paralysis in one of his legs, making farm work to difficult to manage. He would wear a leg brace and use a crutch. A death certificate will be researched, but he may have had Polio which is caused by ingesting fecal matter.

Benjamin and Jane Greenawalt's Children were all born in Franklin County Pennsylvania:

1. Guy Angle Greenawalt was born December 10<sup>th</sup> 1903 in Southampton Township, and died March 15<sup>th</sup> 1981
2. Melvin Angle Greenawalt was born November 16<sup>th</sup> 1907, and died February 4<sup>th</sup> 1909 of measles
3. Norman Earl Greenawalt was born September 13<sup>th</sup> 1909 in Lurgan Township, and died June 6<sup>th</sup> 2001
4. Elsie Greenawalt was born December 31<sup>st</sup> 1911 on the Blue Mountain farm, and died August 19<sup>th</sup> 2007
5. Emma Jane Greenawalt was born February 7<sup>th</sup> 1917 in Shippensburg, and died December 21<sup>st</sup> 1999

By 1914 Benjamin and Jane would move to Shippensburg. It would here where they would open a small grocery store and ice cream parlor on Railroad Street. The family would live two blocks way on South Penn Street. This is where

Benjamin would also take an interest in photography and photo development. Unfortunately all of the photos were lost in a fire. As Benjamin continued to have problems with his leg, the local Doctor began to treat him with strychnine, most likely a homeopathic remedy of the day. Benjamin would eventually circumvent the use of this oral treatment, and would pass away on November 1<sup>st</sup> 1916, the same year that his wife was pregnant with Emma Jane. tuberculosis of the hip" - complicated by malnutrition and exhaustion  
Benjamin died resulting from ".

Jane would not remarry, and raised her children with little help. Guy once related that the children did "piece work" at home in order to stay out of public care - a state home. They were very poor, but may have received help from Jane's father Samuel Angle, who was considered well-to-do financially. When Samuel died June 29<sup>th</sup> 1926 he left a will, written March 14<sup>th</sup> 1917 and witnessed by Samuel's brother-in-law, W.H. Hykes, which indicated a trust was established for his grandchildren. The trust permitted the grandchildren to draw out funds for education. The money was to be disbursed between his grandchildren (or their heirs if they were deceased). Before Samuel died he amended his will and trust to include language meant to inspire his grandchildren to make something of themselves. The trust was to be invested until the death of his last child, which would be his daughter Gertrude L. Angle, who died in 1971 at the age of 99. The final estate settlement of one hundred and twenty thousand dollars was disbursed among the remaining heirs, including Guy, Norman, Elsie, and Emma Greenawalt.

### *5th Generation Nicholas Greenawalt Families*

5.1 Guy Angle Greenawalt (*Unknown German Parent , Nichalos-1, Peter-2, Henry-3, Benjamin-4*) Guy was born December 10<sup>th</sup> 1903 in the Greenawalt home in Mongul Southampton Township Franklin County Pennsylvania. While attending Georgetown University he met and married Mary Virginia (a.k.a. Virginia or Ginny) Clark on March 30<sup>th</sup> 1940 at All Saints Memorial Episcopal Church in Chevy Chase Maryland. Mary was born March 23<sup>rd</sup> 1918 in New Jersey to Joseph Bowden Clark and Mary Hays Gregory .

As Guy turned 18 he went off to the Philadelphia area, where there were already a Greenawalt connection; his Uncle David Franklin Greenawalt who was an owner and President of a Clothing Mill, and Annie Greenawalt-Wenger. While there Guy received one month of electronics training, and began to work making electronic equipment for Leeds and Northrop near North Wales outside North Philadelphia. Guy may have lived with his Uncle Frank, who lived within ten miles from where Guy worked.

About six weeks later Guy went to work for Western Electric near the North Station of the Pennsylvania Railroad, just north of Broad Street Philadelphia. Guy was helping to make broadcasting sets for Navy battleships. in North Philadelphia a civilian defense contractor in South Philly ship yards. While in this area, Guy lived with his Aunt Annie.

It was also during this time in 1922 that Guy applied to join the Army Air Corp. While waiting for the application to be processed, he went home to Shippensburg. It was while you were home that Guy's grandfather Samuel Angle helped support Guy's decision to enter college. After applying to Dartmouth, Swarthmore, and Center College, you were accepted at Center, where he worked his way through school between 1923 and 1934. In 1924 Guy transferred to Carnegie Technology, currently part of Carnegie Mellon University Pittsburg Pennsylvania. In 1926 when his grandfather Samuel Angle died, Guy dropped out of school for a while and went to work as a draftsman with the Pennsylvania State Highway Department on Wood Street Pittsburg. The same location where the Pittsburg Three Rivers Stadium would be built. Before graduating from Carnegie Technology, the professor of Civil Engineering spoke to Guy and suggested that he stop working and obtain financial support to finish his education. Guy turned to his uncle David Franklin who at that time operated a woolen mill in the Venango area of Philadelphia. Guy would eventually graduate with an Engineering Degree.

While at Carnegie Technology Guy pledged with the Sigma Alpha Epsilon ( $\Sigma$ AE or SAE) fraternity. Guy became a member of SAE at the Pennsylvania Phi chapter at Carnegie Tech (now Carnegie-Mellon) on June 8<sup>th</sup> 1928. He served as

Eminent Chronicler (Corresponding Secretary) for the Fall 1927 and Spring 1928 semesters. He graduated with a Bachelors of Science in June 1928. He was not a member of any other campus clubs, honor societies or sports. The Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity had its roots in the south, founded at the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa in 1856. The first northern chapter open in 1883 in Pennsylvania College, now known as Gettysburg College. By 1884 the fraternity opened a new chapter in Northwestern University in Chicago Illinois. The Carnegie Technology Sigma Alpha Epsilon chapter was founded in 1919, and the True Gentleman creed of Sigma Alpha Epsilon was adopted sometime in the early 1930s. By 2011 it has grown to become the largest social fraternity in the world. Guy would remain a lifelong active member in Sigma Alpha Epsilon affairs and social functions.

After graduating in 1928 Guy went to Chicago, and later to a surveying camp in Davis West Virginia, where in 1929 he received a certification in surveying. While back in Chicago, Guy went to the University of Chicago, and Law School. While attending Law School he worked on mine tipping equipment at the Wrigley Building, and for Keller and Harrington in the design of the Bascula Bridges. For a time Guy worked in the steel mills in Gary Indian, traveling back and forth from Chicago University campus on the South Shore train.

Guy never did enter the Army Air Corp, and in May 1930 Guy went to work for the Patent Office in Washington D.C., where he worked for several years while he went back to night school, graduating with a Law Degree from the George Washington University Law School in Washington D.C. Guy continued working for the Patent Office during World War II, when the office was relocated to Richmond Virginia. While attending George Washington University he met and married Mary Virginia Clark on March 30<sup>th</sup> 1940 at All Saints Memorial Episcopal Church in Chevy Chase Maryland. Virginia also attended Georgetown where she was a member of Phi Mu Sorority. Virginia attend college for two years, and in 1939 her and Guy attended a Phi Mu dance social.

After World War II was over, Guy and his family went to Chicago Illinois where he worked in a private Law practice.

Guy and Mary had the following children.

1. Mary Jane Greenawalt was born May 30<sup>th</sup> 1941 in Washington D.C.
2. Anne Clark Greenawalt was born July 17<sup>th</sup> 1943 in Richmond Virginia
3. Susan Jo Greenawalt was born June 20<sup>th</sup> 1947 in Chicago Illinois
4. Guy (Andy) Andrew Greenawalt was born March 3<sup>rd</sup> 1961 in Evanston, Illinois

The family eventually settled in Wilmette Illinois until 1965, when Guy and Virginia moved about five miles away to the Chicago suburb of Northfield Illinois.

Guy died from complications relating to cancer - chronic lymphatic leukemia on March 15<sup>th</sup> 1981, and is laid to rest at Saint James the Less Episcopal church, Northfield Illinois. <sup>1</sup> A fire in 1987 totally destroyed Guy and Virginia's Northfield home, and very few paper and other personal items could be salvaged. Virginia died Thursday November 2<sup>nd</sup> 2000, at the age of 82 while living at the Homewood Plum Creek Nursing Home in Hanover Pennsylvania. She was laid to rest with her husband Guy at the Saint James the Less Episcopal Church, Northfield Illinois. <sup>2</sup>

5.2 Melvin Angle Greenawalt (*Unknown German Parent , Nichalos-1, Peter-2, Henry-3, Benjamin-4*) Mevin was born 1907 and died 1909

5.3 Norman Earl Greenawalt (*Unknown German Parent , Nichalos-1, Peter-2, Henry-3, Benjamin-4*) Norman was born 1909 and married Florence from Shippensburg Pennsylvania. He obtained a college degree in from Clark University in Massachusetts, and taught geography at Valley Forge, and during WWII he worked for the newly formed Office of Strategic Services (today known as the Central Intelligence). Norman went to the Teheran Conference in 1943 and assisted in developing maps for the invasion of Italy. The Tehran Conference, codenamed Eureka, was the meeting between Joseph Stalin, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Winston Churchill from November 28 to December 1<sup>st</sup> 1943. Most of the conference was held at the Soviet Embassy in Tehran, Iran. Norman retired when he was 62 years old, and lived in Falls Church Virginia, where he lived until his death.

Norman may have also developed maps for National Geographic. They had no children.

5.4 Elsie Greenawalt (*Unknown German Parent , Nichalos-1, Peter-2, Henry-3, Benjamin-4*) Elsie was born 1911. There is no evidence if Elsie married a man named Moul, but she did have a son who would be named Walter Moul. She then married William (Sid) Sidney Johnson who was born April 17<sup>th</sup> 1914 and died May 30<sup>th</sup> 1995. Sid may have unofficially adopted Walter. Elsie and Sid had no children.

5.4.1. Walter Moul was born in 1930. He married Doreen (?), and live in Chambersburg Pennsylvania  
Walter and Doreen had one daughter.

5.4.1.1 Kathleen Moul who was born 1954, and married John Cullen.

They live in Appleton Wisconsin, and have two children

6.1 Mary Jane Greenawalt (*Unknown German Parent , Nichalos-1, Peter-2, Henry-3, Benjamin-4, Guy-5*) Mary was born May 30<sup>th</sup> 1941. She married Jeffery Barlett Dunbar on November 23<sup>rd</sup> 1973 at Saint James the Less church in Northfield Illinois. Jeff was born June 11<sup>th</sup> 1943 in Worchester Massachusetts to Richard Lewis Dunbar who was born in Winthrop Massachusetts, and Madeline Nancy Barrows who was born June 3<sup>rd</sup> 1917/18. Richard and Madeline divorced, and Madeline legally dropped her first name; her new name is Nancy McDougall.

Mary taught school and was a guidance counselor for Montgomery County Maryland and Meadville Crawford County Pennsylvania School system. Mary retired from teaching and became a real estate agent in the Pittsburg Pennsylvania area. Mary's husband Jeff is a retired professor. Together they have two sons:
